What do Information System Specialists do?

Information Technology Specialists' work has a large impact on core functions within organizations. They perform a number of data administration, data security, and technological infrastructure related tasks. Below are some of the tasks that Information Systems Specialists encounter in their work:

- Collect and analyze data to identify areas for improvement within an organization's IT infrastructure
- Design, develop, test, implement and oversee IT systems
- Develop quality assurance procedures and tests for the development and improvement of new and existing systems
- Develop policies, procedures and contingency plans to minimize the effects of security breaches

Career pathways & potential earnings of Information System Specialists

Information System Specialists can progress into senior management and executive roles with adequate experience and knowledge:

Computer System Programmers



Programmers earn starting wages of \$23/hr, but wages can scale, with earning going up to \$58/hr with experience and skill

Information System Specialists



Programmers can transition into information systems roles with some training and certification, and can earn up to \$62/hr.

Computer and Information System Managers



Responsible for the data needs and technical support of a department, computer and IS managers can earn up to \$77/hr.

How do I become an Information System Specialists?

There are several educational, licensing and training requirements to become an Information System Specialist. Some requirements may vary by province or company. Below are the most commonly required qualifications to work as an Information System Specialist:

- **Minimum Education:** Bachelors degree in computer science, computer systems engineering, software engineering, business administration or a related discipline, or a college diploma in computer science.
- **Certification and Licensing:** Some employers may require a Certified Information Systems Specialist (CISA) or Certified Internal Auditor (CIA) or related information technology designation.
- Training and other requirements: Experience in computer programming may be required.



Important skills to have as an Information System Specialist?

The complex and interconnected nature of networks within organizations requires Information System Specialists to have extensive knowledge of computer and network infrastructure. These skills are developed through education and previous experience in other information technology related roles. Below are common skills that will help information systems specialists succeed:
